## The Duties of the Three TLR Board Positions up for Election This May

As chief executive officer, the President is responsible to the membership and the Board of Directors for the effective administration of Region affairs, and exercises authority over all other officers and staff members.

## The duties and responsibilities of the President include the following items:

- I. The President is responsible for the adherence of the region to NMRA policies.
- 2. Chairing all TLR business meetings and caucuses.
- 3. Calling mid-year meetings.

- 4. Appointing the first superintendent of a new division on the recommendation of the Vice-President.
- 5. Appointing committee chairpersons.
- 6. Appointing the Assistant Treasurer if requested.
- 7. The President shall appoint a nomination chairman for each business year. (Traditionally this is the immediate Past President who serves until there is a new past president).
- 8. The nomination chairman must have served a minimum of two years on the board.

## Secretary:

It is the Secretary's duty to inform the appropriate persons of the particulars of upcoming meetings.

- I. Formulate an agenda for all Regional meetings.
- 2. Record minutes from all Regional meetings.
- 3. Prepare Minutes of the Regional meetings to be published in the Fusee.

### **Convention Director:**

- I. The Convention Director shall be a representative of the President working with convention chairmen.
- 2. The Convention Director should determine feasible sites for future conventions and approach appropriate persons to bid for conventions.
- 3. The Convention Direc-

tor should be in contact with all active convention chairmen, to ensure that planned conventions are financially sound and all aspects are properly planned and executed.

- 4. The Convention Director should maintain a list of clinicians willing to present clinics at annual conventions
- 5. The Convention Director should report to the BOD on convention business including financial reports.
- 6. The Convention Director shall ensure fair rotation of conventions throughout the Region.
- 7.A written report must be provided to the Fusee once a year

## Ever been to another Region's convention? Here's how we stack up against the NER. Part 2

It wouldn't be a convention without a contest, and the NER had an impressive one. The quality of the modeling was exceptional - almost as good as that seen at TLR conventions. (Ok, I'm joking -- the models were every bit as good as ours.) Just like the TLR, the folks who run the NER contest are concerned that the number of entries seems to be decreasing. At this particular convention, there were 26 models entered in the judged contest, and six entered in the Model Showcase (non-judged). There were 40 photos entered in the photography contest.

Something that really caught my eye was the interesting way the NER handles its modeling contest: there are two categories of entries, one for modelers who've never entered a contest before, and one for modelers who have. This way the novice modelers don't have to go up against the seasoned veterans. I thought that was a great way to give newer modelers the confidence to enter a contest.

And that was the convention. All in all, a fun time. In many ways it was eye-opening to me to see how closely the TLR's and NER's conventions follow the same general format.

As a postscript, I'll add that I ventured out to the East Coast several days early to visit my good

friend Chuck Diljak. In that time we were fortunate enough to be able to visit Tony Koester's NKP layout, along with Tony's friend Perry Squire's Shawmut layout. And NMRA Director Pete Magoun managed to schedule us a tour of Dick Elwell's Hoosac Valley Railroad, a layout that graced the cover of "Great Model Railroads 2008," and has now edged out George Sellios's FSM as my all-time favorite. Dick is an incredibly gracious host, and has an absolutely beautiful layout.



## The Achievement Program Volunteer Certificate

It has been several years since I have reviewed the requirements to receive the eleven Achievement Program (AP) certificates.

There have been changes in several certificate requirements over time. These are all listed on the NMRA website (www.nmra.org), and I strongly encourage those with access to the internet to visit the website and read about the requirements firsthand. The Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) forms are also available on the website for downloading.

I'll start with the Association Volunteer. This is the most awarded certificate because there are so many opportunities to acquire the required time units toward the certificate.

At least sixty (60) time units (TU) from NMRA activities are re-

quired to qualify for the AP certificate. These TUs can be acquired from National, Regional, and Division level activities, and you need to note on the SOQ for which level you are earning the TUs for each activity.

I won't review the National level TUs since you are savvy enough to know about the AP if you are involved at the National level.

People who serve at the Regional level as a committee manager earn two TUs per month, and members of the committee earn one TU per month of service. For example the region convention chair would earn two TUs per month, committee members would earn one TU per month and someone staffing the registration desk at the convention would earn one TU for the event.

At the Division level the rate of accrual is one half as much (one TU for a manager and ½ TU for a committee member). Members of 100% NMRA clubs also earn credits at this rate.

Members who open their layouts for NMRA sponsored tours also earn TUs on a per event basis. Regional open houses earn three TUs per day of opening and Division tours also earn three TUs per day. Modular layouts at NMRA sponsored events would also earn points at the same rate. The accrual is maxed out at 12 TUs for a National event, 6 TUs for a Regional event, and three TUs at the Division level.

Editors of regional NMRA publications (Yes this is you Wes) earn TUs at the same rate as a regional committee manager, i.e. two TUs per month.

Contest judges can earn TUs on a per event basis – three at the Na-

tional level, two at the Regional level, and one at the Division level

A Boy Scout Merit Badge Counselor can earn one TU per month of service and one TU per qualified scout.

Presenters of live clinics can also earn volunteer TUs. The first presentation earns points towards the Author certificate, but any additional presentations of the clinic can earn TUs towards the Volunteer certificate – two TUs at the Region and one TU at the Division.

In an ideal world you will maintain a record of your TUs earned on an SOQ form and get the necessary verification and signature from your supervisor as the TUs are earned. In the event many years have passed and people have passed away, you can still have the Region President, Secretary, or Historian go through their files and verify the period of service where you have earned TUs.

If after you have reviewed the information on the NMRA website you still have questions about the TUs you are accruing towards the volunteer certificate, you can contact me using the information in the Fusee masthead. In the event there is a discrepancy between the above information and the NMRA website, the website governs.





## **Backdrop Mounting**

Scenery is one of the major reasons visitors come to see our layouts. On the new Minneapolis & Northland Railroad Company (M&N) one important component of scenery is the backdrops. Backdrops help set the period scene for the trains. Backdrops are also wonderful to have on the railroad for photography.

The backdrops on my railroad are cut from 4 x 8 sheets of hardboard purchased at the home improvement store. Before mounting, the hardboard backdrop is cut to the desired length and height. On the Minneapolis & Northland Railroad Company the hardboard is cut to a fifteen (15") inch height of which fourteen ( 14" ) inches shows above the bench work and one inch (I") sits in a L-channel below the edge of the bench work. Once cut to correct size, the hardboard backdrop is painted a sky blue color purchased at the local home improvement store. I used a roller to apply the sky blue water base paint.

To create a distant look at the horizon, you can add a light white haze at the horizon at the same time you do the blue without waiting for the blue to dry or you can add the horizon haze after the blue is dry. I have used a roller, brush, sponge, or an air brush to add the horizon haze. Once all paint applied is dry you are ready for mounting.

On my railroad I wanted a mounting system that would allow the backdrop to be removed without the use of tools to allow me to work on the railroad with the backdrop removed. To accom-

plish easy removal, I thought it would be best if the backdrop was mounted in a slot that would hold it in place without fasteners such as screws. I finally decided an L-channel, each leg being 3/4" wide. would One leg of the Lchannel mounts to the bench work and the other leg of the L -channel

and bench work side/ edge creates the slot for holding the hardboard backdrop. After looking around the home improvement store. I decided the best L-channel for the mount was that used for holding suspended ceiling. The Lchannel is used on the walls of the room to hold ceiling panels and the T-channel that holds the suspended

ceiling panels. The suspended ceiling L-channel which comes in eight foot lengths is made of light gauge metal, easy to cut with tin snips, easy to drill, and the price is

inexpensive.

Once the L-channel is cut to the length of the backdrop section to be mounted, I drilled holes in one side of L-channel for mounting screws used to attach it to the bench work. I mounted one side of the L-channel to the underside of my L-girder bench work with sheetrock screws using the predrilled holes, leaving the other side of the L-channel away from the bench work the thickness of the hardboard, thereby, creating the slot for holding the hardboard (see photo).


The above method works great for straight sections; however, what about curved areas? The same L-channel works just as well. Rather than one piece of L-channel running the entire backdrop section, the L-channel is cut into smaller straight sections allowing the hardboard backdrop section to bend around curves. ( see photo) Another method to bend the L-channel for curves is to cut our triangle notches or larger rectangle areas on the mounting side of the L-channel to allow it to

bend when mounted.

With the L-channel mounted you place the hardboard backdrop in the slot on the edge of the layout

created. The work is done. You can go back to the real fun, running trains and enjoy seeing the trains with the backdrop you have created.

Maybe after a time you may want to enhance your mounted backdrop with other scenery features including clouds, hills, trees and buildings. With the mounting method I have presented here, the backdrop can easily be removed for adding these additional scenery features if you choose. Of course, the real benefit of this mounting method is easy removal of the backdrop at any time to work on railroad itself.

Remember, "Model Railroading, no matter what facet, is fun."
