TLR Contest Director Report - Shadow Redington

2025 TLR Convention in Willmar, MN Special People's Choice Contest Category Announcement

The Special Project for the 2025 Willmar Convention has been identified. This year the theme will be "One Square Foot." This is a special event that has only one rule: The entry can only be one square foot (total area) for the base. Participants may dimensionally configure the base as they choose as long as the total area does not exceed 1 square foot. (I.E. 1/2' X 2' would be ok)

In the case of railroad modelers, just a single square foot for its base. In "Z" scale it would be a fair amount of modeling. In HO, S, G, or F scale it would most likely have a lot of special detail.

In the case of the craft folks, same thing, only one square foot in size. It could be needlepoint, knitting, or sewing.

At the convention in Willmar, MN the Special People's Choice model category is intended to encourage all participants to scratch build a structure. The objective is for individuals who have never scratch built anything to start with a basic structure. This structure is called, "One Square Foot."

Requirements:

- 1) No kit or kit components, No kit bashing, 100% scratch built.
- 2) Detailed "One Square Foot" Modules can have homemade decals, dry transfers, but not commercial decals or dry transfers. These may be printed paper or card stock (up to 110 pound) and attached to scenery.
- 3) LEDs or other lighting to illuminate the module is acceptable but not a requirement.
- 4) Basic tools (hobby knives, rulers, etc.) available to all modelers are to be used. This excludes laser cutters, 3D printers, or home CNC machines.
- 5) More sophisticated tools may be used to make structures that are submitted in the "Judged Models" category as structures. What is described here is for submission to the People's Choice category.
- 6) If your module has a humorous theme it may also be submitted in the "Thumbs" People's Choice category.

If you have never scratch built anything, this is a great way to start. We are looking forward to seeing you at the 2025 Willmar, MN convention.


From the Desk of Matt Lentz - Simple Buss Bar Power Design

Model Railroaders on Social Media: Boomer Diorama

In my model railroading experience, I have learned much by reading books/magazines, watching DVDs and interacting with fellow modelers, as well as social media. In the past few years, I have subscribed to a few different YouTube channels that have model railroading/rail fanning content. One of my favorites channels is Boomer Diorama.

Boomer Diorama, aka Boomer, is a model railroader from British Columbia, Canada. He had experience, in his younger days, with military and ship building models, which led to a career in the tv, movie and theatre industry. His channel has nearly 600+ videos and has over 27000 subscribers.

At the beginning of his channel, Boomer documented his shelf layout Glover Road, which led him three years ago to build his current bedroom sized River Road HO switching layout. He models a proto freelance version of the SRY RR by blending a series of dioramas (or scenes) seamlessly. Or as he calls it "30 miles in 30ft".

His channel covers: scratch building, scenery and tree making, weathering and locomotive/rolling stock builds while passing on his knowledge to his viewers. My favorite videos of his, so far, have been the Carrier Princess boat "staging cassette" for his dock, his technics on roads and building a moose (yes, you read it right he built a moose). His knowledge and story telling is both entertaining and educational, while mentoring the viewer in growing their own skills. Always encouraging and never discouraging the viewer. A note pad would be handy to jot down the info for the various paints and products he uses, if you choose to try out some of his techniques. I highly recommend checking out Boomer Diorama on YouTube.

Modeling on a Dime- By Dan Dossa

A Wall Mounted Exhaust Fan

There used to be a show on HGTV called "Design on a Dime" which featured inexpensive home


decorating ideas. I decided to start what I hope will be a forum in which we can share inexpensive modeling hacks and tricks. Hence, welcome to the birth of "Modeling on a dime."

In our first installment, I'll show how I modeled a wall mounted exhaust fan. These fans are a common, though not oft modeled, feature on industrial buildings.

Fortunately for us, the material to create it is probably in your home right now and the price is right: free. Here's how.



The starting point is one of those plastic silica containers found in pill bottles (photo below).



Looking at these, note that the ends have perforations, and ribs which have the appearance of fan blades. I separated the cap from the body and discarded the silica (the ones I use advise not eating the silica, so just don't, LOL). The cap has wider blades, while the body has deeper ones. I used the cap. I lightly painted a rusty primer color (be careful not to clog the perforations) and highlighted the fan blades with silver (photo below).



A screen added to what would be the outside of the fan dresses the unit up. A piece of window screen would work, but I used a patching piece from Menards, trimmed to fit. My building allowed scraping

away the outer block detail and drilling directly into the underlying siding. If that doesn't work a square of styrene with a hole the size of your fan will also work. I prefer drilling the hole slightly undersized and then fitting it by hand so that the outside of the "housing" fits flush. The square was painted to look like concrete (Rustoleum brand "Fossil" spray paint is a spot on match for the old Floquil Weathered

Concrete). With the fan in place, I finished by installing an electrical box and conduit (made from scrap styrene and wire) and an overhead rain shield.

Here is the result (Photo below). If I had a scrap of window screen (or could get one from a hardware store) the cost was essentially zero. Can't beat the price!

Zoom Meeting Highlights with NMRA President Gordy Robison - Ken Zieska

Worth Sharing Again! I applied for the Grouper benefit and received it, definitely worth the effort to apply. (See below, Neil)

The amazing power of the internet allowed NMRA President Gordy Robinson to join us via Zoom for a conversation. Gordy greeted us from his Home in Scotland and then shared some interesting news from the NMRA National.

Gordy highlighted a new initiative the NMRA has been working on. Healthcare organizations have recognized the importance of people involved in group activities that keep the active and engaged. While this is true of all ages, it is particularly true for retirement age people. Grouper has been working with many health care insurers to help and they have rolled out a program with the NMRA where members over 65 can have their membership dues reimbursed just for being involved.

Weathering Grilles on Diesel Locomotives – Air Brushing Technique – Article and Photos by Joe Binish

After paint, decals, and a flat coat (I use Testor's Dullcoat), we are ready to start weathering the grilles on the locomotive. Try and be patient enough to let it dry, there should be no solvent carrier smell. Note the support structure of the carbody tool into the grills ©




I don't like etched locomotive grills. Well, maybe they are ok on F3 phase 4, F7 or F9. Maybe E units. But "woven" grilles? No etching! The best looking are the Stewart/Kato HO scale Fs. Just my opinion, but no etching!!

So how to make them look like there is the day-to-day dirt on/in them? They are basically vacuum filters, keeping the air in the carbody of the locomotive "clean". I have used washes in the past (Tamiya or homemade taco sauce), the results were too random. Pastels in my hands are an area media, no control. So, I decided to airbrush grimy gray over the openings, masking to highlight the carbody structure behind the grills.


The materials I used are as follows:

- Testors 36081 Euro 1 gray (of course discontinued, thank you RPM), now I use Tamiya XF-63 German Gray.
- Duck Brand general purpose masking tape.
- Paasche VL airbrush.
- Lacquer thinner/Mr Color Leveling Thinner
- (Tamiya is an alcohol based acrylic, the Leveling thinner makes it spray as a lacquer)
- Use what ever paint you like, Mission Models and Vallejo make FS.36081 as well. I have a hard time spraying acrylics.

Follow along while I highlight the grills on a Proto 2000 FA1.



I have masked off the entire grill area and covered the support structure. I added more tape to cover the rest of the shell, I tend to blow paint all over....



The paint should be very thin-one or two drops of paint in a teaspoon pr so of thinner. It would be a wash if I were to apply with a brush.

Products that I now use...



I have removed the structure masking. It only took me about 4 times of having to remask the perimeter when doing previous locomotives to figure out to do the perimeter masking so I could leave it on for the next step

Final spray over the whole grill. Note how the structure elements have just a bit of grime on them, but still show up as "blocking" the airflow and dirt into the carbody.



Below are a few of my Central Of Minnesota F2/3s with the grill treatment. 80 has yet to get the grill treatment, but has had a "taco sauce" wash



Editor's note: The technique Joe use's here for grills can also be used for weathering of other areas on engines, rolling stock and structures that get dirt/grime build up. I have used this technique to get subtle streaking of grime/rust

on structure roofs.



Hennepin Overland Corner - Article and Photos By Bruce Johnson

One topic that comes up a lot when us older model railroaders get together is, how do we get the young kids interested in the hobby. When I was young, my grandfather had a layout in his basement. It was O scale and kind of rough compared to today's standards because almost everything had to be scratch built. The basement was dark, musty, cramped. To me, it was magical. The crossing gate actually went down when the train came along, the dinner was detailed and lit up on the inside, and he had both a passenger train and a freight train. I decided then, at age 10, that I was hooked and I wanted to carry on in my grandfathers' footsteps. I found out later that he was one of the six founding members of what is now the Twin Cities Model Railroad Club.

I am a member of the Hennepin Overland Railway Historical Society. My main job is the scenery committee chairman. We have been lucky to get several new young members. As scenery chair, I tend to approach them and encourage them to help us out with scenery projects. They are usually a little skeptical because it's fairly intimidating to look at what we have and think they can contribute up to our standards. I reassure them that I don't expect them to be an expert at their age. If they want to learn, are willing to try many different tasks, and take their time and strive for excellence, we can teach them anything. For me, it's rewarding to watch them try new things, learn and to see their confidence grow as they realize that they can create some amazing things.

The Hennepin Overland has been blessed with three young members that have stepped up and are contributing a lot to the layout. Sam Romig joined about three years ago. He started helping me with a retaining wall that we installed, painted, and weathered. He volunteered to help us out with lighting some buildings and now oversees all our lighting, sound, and animation. We now have a special building in his honor, Romig Engineering. Aiden Nelson has been with us for about 8 months now and after taking on an 8 foot long rustic wooden fence, is now our water effects master and many other scenery projects. Evan Bertram has only been a member for about 4 months but is volunteering with several projects and looks like he will be a valuable member.

Trains have been in my blood from a very young age. I played with wooden trains extensively when I was little, and then later on I graduated to a Life Like HO starter set. Over time the collection expanded to a full 4x8 layout with track plans that changed a time or three. Building scenery was never my strong suit, but I did find the electrical side of things fascinating. One notable accomplishment I have from that era was wiring an engine terminal and turntable that was fully functional, where two DC mainlines could meet and take turns servicing their locomotives. As I went into high

school, trains faded into the background for a while as I pursued other interests. While I was in college, I was feeling particularly isolated during the pandemic, so my Dad nudged me towards the Hennepin Overland. When I joined the organization, more than anything I was looking to meet other people in the model railroading community, and maybe find some friends along the way. Attending work nights and operating for open houses allowed me to do just that. As Bruce mentioned earlier, I started out doing scenery with him, and then I went on to tackle building lights and animation projects. For our sawmill scene, I installed a set of computer speakers under the sawmill building and its beehive sawdust burner.

The speakers are placed so that the sound comes directly out of the sawmill





and burner for our guests to hear. When the burner is turned on, a set of flickering LEDs light up the inside of the burner and makes the cinder screen glow. It really adds a nice touch to the scene for our Trains After Dark events and is one of the projects that I'm most proud of! As you can see, I have a couple of things I need to finish like the bleed through on the ground and the walls need painting on the inside to stop the light from coming through. Another project I'm excited about is our forest fire scene. In addition to the beautifully toasted trees the scenery guys made, I've been adding tiny LEDs scattered around the scene to simulate embers glowing after a big fire. The lighting parts of the scene are still a work in progress, but I'm really happy with how it's turned out so far. Making cool projects is satisfying by myself, but doing things as part of a team that really appreciates what I do makes everything ten times more

rewarding. I came to the Hennepin Overland looking for a community; I stayed because they gave me a way to contribute to something greater than anything I could do alone.

Hello, my name Is Aiden Nelson. I've always been fascinated with trains, starting with wooden toys on the floor and Day Out with Thomas rides. When I was about eight years old, I inherited a collection of model trains from my great uncle; while nothing too special I had a loop of track and could run trains. As I got older I got to experiment a bit with

custom car loads, weathering, and doing basic maintenance like replacing trucks and swapping horn hook couplers for Kadee's. As my interest in more serious modeling grew, so did my collection. I had been looking for a club for a while and finally in the winter of 2023 I got the chance to join the Hennepin Overland.

Being at the Hennepin Overland has been a great experience for me. I had taken quite an interest in doing scenery work but never really had an opportunity to. That is until Bruce and Chris took me in so to speak and told me what needed to be done and how to do it properly. My first project was replacing a wooden fence that was in dire need of work. I felt





very welcome and appreciated, but also not restricted in what I could do. After I finished the fence, Chris, who is another member of the scenery committee helped me with static grass and showed me how he does ground work. After Bruce gave the okay, I worked on scenery on multiple other parts of the layout. Currently we are revamping our farm scene with new ground cover, trees, water effects, and a new corn field. My other big project I have worked on is replacing the water fall underneath Clothespin Trestle. I used a technique I found online using wire with poly fiber, covered in water effects, and then snowflakes. I think the final result turned out great. It is an amazing scene on our layout that I think has been much improved with the new waterfall and all the new trees made by Chris. At the club I feel like I am a part of something, the

people are welcoming, and I don't feel like I am shut out of opportunities to improve the layout because I am young or don't have years and years of experience.

My name is Evan, I was initially into 3-rail O scale as my dad had got me a Lionel set when I was around 7, however just a few years later I saw my uncle throwing out an old HO scale set and I asked him if I could have it, the answer was a "Yes" and the rest is history. A few years later I was at a train show with my dad and he bought me an L&N U28B #2500 with DCC & Sound which to this day is still my favorite locomotive. Even though I mostly model Louisville & Nashville I don't limit myself to it and I own quite a bit of other stuff as well.

I joined the Hennepin Overland Museum in late winter 2023. I was only initially looking for a group of people with similar interests as me since my hometown has almost no one, however soon after joining I was interested in a few of the committees; the scenery, electrical, and car ones specifically. The club is very open to new people and there is something for everyone. I really enjoy running trains for other people. While I am not able to get to the club very often during the week due to work and living over an hour away, when I am able to make it and help out it is a nice feeling. Bruce, who is the head of the scenery committee has helped me a ton with learning how to build kits and do weathering, without his help I wouldn't know a lot of the good techniques that I now know.

For me as an old fart, this is so comforting knowing that the future is in good hands. Not only for Hennepin Overland, but for the hobby in general. As the scenery committee chair of the Hennepin Overland Railway Historical Society, It has been so rewarding getting to know these wonderful young men and having the opportunity to mentor them. Stop down at our open house hours sometime between Labor day and Memorial day, Saturdays and Sunday between 1-4pm and ask to meet these guys.

What's on Your Workbench?







Some of you may know that I recently relocated to the Twin Cities (My wife and I downsized into a townhouse). The townhouse fortunately for me, has a large unfinished basement that I am in the process of transforming into my new layout room. Here are a few updated pictures of my progress since the last issue of the Fusee, Wiring has been completed, only ceiling and flooring left to do.



Here is what is literally on my work bench! I recently picked these older engines up off of eBay and at a train show for my new standard gauge layout. The GP-18 is an older Proto 2000, that unfortunately had the typical split drive axle gears needing replacement. I also installed a decoder and led lights. Still a decent value even with all the work it needed. The F-7 is an old MRC model it looks decent compared to the Athearn blue box versions, it required the motor (found a good used motor on eBay) and decoder to be replaced. Not the best deal I have gotten, but, the engine runs great now.

Modeler's Tip

Creating scrap metal piles and gondola loads

Leder Brothers is a scrap metal recycler along the Hiawatha Line of the Minnesota Commercial/CP/SOO/
Milwaukee Railroads. Studying Google Maps I discerned piles of scrap steel and scrap aluminum awaiting shipment via rail. Creating the mounds of scrap metals found at Leder Brothers, and loads of scrap for gondolas was an enjoyable process. Here's how I created mine.

I have a friend who has a machine tool business and he was kind enough to send me a box of stainless steel shavings. Using tin snips I cut the shavings into smallish irregular pieces. I found I could also just break some with my fingers (be careful, the dang things can be sharp).



I built a small jig that can hold a wooden false floor for a gondola. On my line the gons are all 53' in length so I just cut the false floors ensuring they would fit. I painted those with flat brown primer. Once the false floors are dry, I place a plastic bag into the jig, and then put the floor piece



into it. I used Flex Seal gel glue, squirting it liberally onto the floor (you want this about ½" to ½" deep, although it doesn't have to be exact). In the center I put a bent paper



clip down into the glue to create a handle so the loads can be lifted out. Bend the paper clip so it the loop at the top is about 3/8" above the load you will be adding. Once that is in place I fill the jig with aluminum scraps to roughly 1/2" deep. Using a rag or a few thicknesses of paper towel I press the scraps into the glue. Sometimes you have to work this around a bit, but the idea is to get the scraps secured into the glue. Put this aside and let it dry overnight. If you are modeling aluminum, remove the gon load, and spray it with a clear dull finish. This mimics the oxidation that happens to aluminum when left outside. If you are modeling steel, however, I spray the load with flat, dark brown primer. Then I overspray with a lighter color (mine was called "cinnamon"). Don't fully coat the loads, instead you this second spray to highlight your load and add a sense of depth to it. Try and keep your loads level with the top of the car sides. Railroads don't overfill scrap gons. If your load looks good but it isn't quite tall enough, just add a some spacers underneath.

For scrap piles I used commercially available scrap piles as my bases. In truth, a piece of florist foam that is carved to shape will work just as well. I painted the bases with grey primer for the aluminum pile, and dark brown primer for the steel piles. The, just as I did with my gon loads, I spread a thick coat of Flex Seal glue over the piles and pressed the scrap pieces into it. For aluminum again I spray it with a flat clear coat. For steel, I use the two applications of paint described above, and then spray the pile with flat clear coat. Remember as you are doing this to feather the scrap piles outward from the bases. This creates a much more realistic appearance. I glued my piles in place, then added more glue around the base and pressed more scrap into it. If I needed to blend it more, I just glued

individual pieces in place. For this stage I paint the steel scrap before installing it.

And that's it!

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
